Heritage in Stone

s the light creeps across the bush to the south of Evergreen Cemetery or south east at the Pioneer Cemetery, one is struck by various hues and shapes, which fades or bounces off trees, marble and granite.

Here we are walking through our past, which provides a history lesson. Today each marker stands like a ledger book for they are all here, "heroes merchants, doctors, housewives" the small and the great. All reposing but once active and vital to our community landscape. For many the only record of their lives are their gravestones.

Jasper and Sarah (Coates) Martin, who came to Milton in 1821, were two of our first settlers. They

must have met with many hardships as they began to carve out a home in what eventually became a community. Just think, dense forest, Indian trails along waterways with wild life friendly or otherwise behind every tree. (Pioneer Cemet.)

George Smith and his wife
Martia Van Allen. George was a
prominent citizen and active in town
operation; Town Clerk and Collector,
Councillor and Mayor. George was
also a merchant, who undoubtedly
greeted customers with the happenings of the day. (Evergreen Cemet.)

Dr. James Cobban, who received his land title on the south boundary of the town in 1837, had the distinction of being one of three doctors between Toronto and Hamilton. Milton residents were lucky to have had such an esteemed doctor so close at hand. (Pioneer Cemet.)

HOUSE PLAQUING UPDATE BY MARSHA WALDIE

We have recently added another house to our list of Historic Homes Vol. III.

356 Broadway, a duplex was built approx. 1914 by David Menzies. Mr. Menzies was born on his family's homestead on Appleby Line near Christie. He was involved in numberous activities during his life: general contractor of D.D. Christie at the Lime kilns, member of the Milton

Ellen E. Freeman was the first to be interred (1881) in what was known as the new Cemetery. She lies repose in what is today a remote secluded section of the cemetery. Two daughters, Louisa 15, Ellen 21 victims of "consumption" and her husband are also buried in Lot 1 Block

1. Mrs. Freeman was age 31.

In years past this was a most prominent location among the old stones as many visitors to the cemetery came across the old swing bridge, which use to cross from Commercial St. over the sixteen mile creek. Today, squirrels, chipmunks, and birds have staked their claim to this lower area.

The heritage of the cemeteries is something to be proud of, but there is also an artistic side. Markers have always boasted a sculptural aspect and today is no different as we find etchings on golf, fishing etc. on modern day stones. Once the weather breaks take a walk through one of our local cemeteries and note these elements and fascinating epitaphs. They are gone but not forgotten!

Fire Brigade, involved in the building of the old theatre on Main St., the goaler's (jailer's) house on Hugh St., travelled to Alaska for gold and much more. He and Dr. C. Martin combined in raising mink and silver foxes on land behind the present Martin St. School. Mr. Menzies had a remarkable memory about Halton's history and was a frequent visitor to our Halton Regional Museum, where he would assist staff. He died in his 90's in 1970.

Heritage Award Winners

Three prominent Miltonians were recognized at our Feb. 15 Heritage Awards ceremony in Hugh Foster Hall. Town councillor John Challinor was cited for his research project on more than 70 Milton-area servicemen who died in the First World War. Their names are on the cenotaphs in Victoria Park and in Nassagaweya. No decision has been taken on how the research will be published.

Our first posthumous winner is writer Mel Robinson for his series of more than 100 columns-family reminiscences and local history - in The Canadian Champion about 25 years ago. Jim Dills was editor - publisher of The Champion at the

time. These columns, illustrated scores of historic photos, re-appeared last fall in the Society's book "Memories of Milton". Mel's son .George, of London, Ont. accepted the award on behalf of himself and his sister, Margaret Wilson of Milton.

Artist Marion Detlor claimed the "visual" award for her series of paintings of Milton's Main St. and historic buildings. (Marion's granddaughter accepted the award: Marion was in Florida) Marion is well known for her community service, including many leading roles in the Horticultural Society. Long-time members of our Society will recall that Marion-elegantly dressed as a "pioneer" - once spoke to us on genealogy.

SHARED HERITAGE

Heritage Award winner Marion (Roblin) Detlor and her husband, Jim, share a Canadian saga. Both the Roblins (Marion is related to former Manitoba Premier Roblin) and the Detlors came to eastern Ontario as Empire Loyalists more than two centuries ago. Marion and Jim's research has revealed that their marriage is not the first to bring together the Roblin and Detlors families. But there's no record of family feuds.

PLENTY LEFT

We don't have to worry about running out of the historic limestone that forms part of our Heritage Awards. Brad Clements, a member of the Society for many years - salvaged a lot of the stone when the Bruce Street School was demolished to make way for the present library. Brad has been our donor since we started the Awards program in the 1990's; he says his "pile" will take care of our needs for the foreseeable future.

WANT AN AFFORDABLE HOBBY? TRY COLLECTING WOODEN TOOLS

Until the 1700's, he said, carpenters made their own tools. By 1850 London was home to 150 manufacturers. On this continent manufacturing began in the New England states before the Civil War. Later Canadian plants opened in Montreal and Ruxton Pond. All these operations ceased after metal replaced wooden tools about a century ago.

The speaker brought many tools from his collection, which are strictly hobby tools, for all to see. Wallace has paid up to \$200 for a plane but most of his tools have cost much less. Wallace frequents the flea markets looking for bargains. An affordable hobby - tools can be bought starting from \$5.00 - \$50.00.

Our Archivist, Sonia Pacheco has been hard at work taking inventory of our archival documents. She has also been working on the school curriculum.



The Milton Historical Society is well represented on Heritage Milton (formerly LACAC) by Ken Keates and Mirella Marshall. The committee welcomed some new members this year.

Good news for all us "brick huggers"! After two years of negotiation, the Boston Church house is going to be moved. The location will be out of Milton, unfortunately but it will be saved. The house is now located on Boston Church Rd. It is a magnificent, Gothic revival, stone house, built in 1851 by Duncan Stewart (for whom Stewarton was named). Although, the house has been vandalized over the last two years, efforts will be made to salvage as much of the interior as possible.

It will be dismantled carefully and rebuilt to it's original glory. Hats off to Chris Lupis (town staff) Tom Murison, Peter Devine and the current owners of the property, who have worked diligently to make this happen.
