


#### New Milton World War I Book Launched!

November 4th was the official launch of the latest book published by the Milton Historical Society entitled Milton Remembers World War I and the Men and Women We Never Knew.

Authors Jim Dills, John Challinor II and editor Ken Lamb were present to sign copies to purchasers of the book. The launch was very successful with over 50 books sold the first day.

This book includes an alphabetical listing and photographs where available of the men and women who participated in the Great War. In total there were approximately 500 from the Milton area. There were 79 local

soldiers killed in the Great War.

The book includes an overview of some of the major battles that involved Canadian troops and looks at life in Milton during the war years and how it affected local families. The soft cover book is 200 pages long and includes 170 photographs and is available for \$25.00 (\$22.50 members) through the Milton Historical Society.

This book is a must have for anyone interested in local history and there were only 250 copies printed so if you don't already have a copy, get yours soon.


#### We lost it! Submitted by Al Kiernan

I am the General Manager of Milton Home Hardware Building Centre and I have a story to share with you. In early June 2006 I noticed an ad in an "Old Car" hobby related newspaper for a 1922 Maxwell. It stated that the vehicle had been used as a delivery truck for Day's Hardware Milton and last licensed in 1940.

Maxwell was built between 1904 and 1925 when it was purchased by Walter Chrysler and became the basis of the Chrysler Corporation as we know it today.

This 1922 was a 4 cylinder, 4 door convertible that had been converted to a truck by cutting the rear portion of the body off and building a wooden cargo box onto the frame. I called around 5:30 PM on the day the ad came out only to be told that another party had already been there and wanted to buy the car, but the deal wasn't firm. After explaining who I was and why I wanted the vehicle I was told "Yes you should have it" but it was buried in a garage

and needed to be uncovered. He would contact me in a few days. I waited patiently, but didn't get a call. Finally, I called the owner and was told that four people wanted it and that to be fair they had decided to start with the first person and he decided to take it. We were second.

After some persuading I was given the buyers name and immediately contacted him. A one hour phone conversation and a visit to see the car failed to pry it from him. I offered to buy it, rent it for one year (2007), buy it with the option of him buying it back at the end of 2007 or find a replacement for him to work on. Nothing Worked. He did allow us to take some pictures. The current owner plans to return it to a car and do a full restoration. We discovered in

our research that the last time this Maxwell had been on the road was 1957 when it was driven in Milton's 100th anniversary parade. As a project we are planning to research our business history in Milton which goes back to 1893 and include Day Hardware (1927-1946). This delivery would have been an interesting addition, but unfortunately.....we lost it!

#### The History of Photography Revealed!

Diane Allenging, the archivist of the Peel Heritage Complex in Orangeville, was our September Guest Speaker. Her presentation led us through the various periods in the development of photography from the earliest to today's Digital cameras.

Historic photographs can be very valuable in capturing important images. As an archivist Diane has witnessed many sad stories of historic photos where the names of those in the photos are unknown. Check your photos at home and make sure that names and dates are available in order that they will have more value for future generations.

The origins of photography were in 1840's in France with the development of Daguerreotypes which involved an emulsion on a piece of tin. These were "one off images" and there were no negatives.

Over the 1860's-1870's the "Carte de visite" was very popular and used as a business card. These cards included portraits taken at a photo studio. In some cases the photos are dated but if they are not then details such as fashion, hair and the way the people posed provide clues to helping date photos.

George Eastman developed cameras with rolls of film in the 1890's and photography changed so that the average person could now begin taking photos...

At the turn of the century Picture Postcards were at their peak. Each little town had photos of its prominent buildings and streets. (The Milton postcards can be seen at Fitzgerald Insurance front window on Main street).

Diane gave the audience tips about keeping photographs in the best condition for the longest time available.

Photos don't like excessive light, humidity or temperature fluctuations. Images will degrade with time and you want to slow down this process as much as possible. Making copies of valuable photos that are degrading is one option to help preserve the image. Cardboard borders on old photos are not good for the images since the cardboard is poor quality paper and a brown colour from the lignin may deteriorate your Photos.

The scrapbook has been a popular way to organize photos but not all are created equal. The cardboard scrapbooks with adhesive and plastic page covers are poor choices if you want to protect your photos for the long term. Lamination of photos is another process that is not good if your are trying to protect your photos for the long run. These days the preferred technique to protect valuable photos is encapsulation with mylar. For more information on protecting your images, visit the Canadian Conservation Website.

Scrapbooks can be a great gift to future family and to the community. The MHS has been the fortunate recipient of several scrapbooks donated to the archives.

#### L. M. Montgomery – The Norval Years

Author Deborah Quaile presented to our members at the October meeting an insight into the life of famous Canadian author L.M. Montgomery. A new book entitled L.M. Montgomery: The Norval Years, 1926-1935 chronicles her personal and professional life. Ms. Montgomery loved Norval and was an active participant and supporter of the local arts including choral and theatre groups.

Lucy loved her garden. She also continued to write and pursue her professional life. The book is available at the Waldie Blacksmith shop and sells for \$30.00.

#### The 164th Battalion

Jim Dills and Ed Goodall spoke at our November meeting about the history of the 164th Battalion. The Halton Dufferin Regiment was established at the onset of the First World War to recruit local area civilians to serve in the armed forces.

The 164th was established in 1915. Patriotism was high at the time. Under Colonel Percy Domville 4 companies were assembled with 2 in Halton and 2 in Dufferin. The offices of the Battalion were established in Milton. The numbers of soldiers required to form a battalion was 1000 and a strong recruiting drive went into action to reach the needed numbers. This even included recruitment meetings after church. The 164th did not reach battalion strength.

In 1916 the battalion was moved to Orangeville even though 2/3 of the recruits were from Halton. In July of 1916 the soldiers left for Camp Borden to get their training. The soldiers marched from the camp to Hamilton and were treated to receptions along the way. In Milton the soldiers were met by council at Steeles avenue. The soldiers assembled in Victoria Park and were fed dinners by ladies of Milton and a free concert at the Methodist church. The troops overwintered in Hamilton. In April 1917 the 164th sailed from Halifax to England and its soldiers were dispersed as replacements to those regiments who had lost



The Milton Historical Society 150th anniversary Celebration Calendar was officially launched Saturday, August 19th at the Waldie Blacksmith Shop.

Special guests on hand to sign purchased calendars included Mayor Gord Krantz, Former Mayor Mike Ledwith, Calendar designer Jim Dills and Don South, one of the persons included in the calendar.

The calendar features historical images of people and places from Milton's past. Each calendar month features a historic photograph and accompanying text to describe the history and details of the photo. The calendar section also lists dates of historical significance to Milton associations. Each month

includes the advertisers who supported the publication. This is a 15 month calendar and retails for \$12.00 to the public (\$10.00 for MHS members). The calendars are available at the Waldie Blacksmith shop, Harris Stationary, Spice of Life and Home Hardware. Sales of the calendar have been brisk. #### Trafalgar celebrates 200 years

In 1806 Trafalgar township was established. The township stretched from the shores of Lake Ontario northward to Steeles Avenue. The Western boundary was Burloak Drive with Winston Churchill form-

ing the Eastern Boundary. Trafalgar township was amalgamated with the Village of Bronte and Oakville in 1962. In 1974 Regional government was introduced and the North half of the township was annexed into the Town of Milton.

Trafalgar township was created after the 1805 Mississauga purchase of land from the Mississauga Indians. The land was populated primarily by United Empire Loyalists who fled the United States after the 1775 American Revolution. The newcomers included many farmers as well as shopkeepers, blacksmiths and others.

The settlers received grants of land and cleared the land so they could farm. Mills were established by the waters of the abundant creeks. Trafalgar township was settled during the early to mid 1800's. The Dundas highway was one of the early roads that was settled. Oakville and the Village of Bronte were also settled early due to their location on the shores of Lake Ontario.

The Trafalgar Township Historical society is a new organisation established in 2006. The society has four goals.

- To scan historical photos historic homes and farms in the area and collect oral histories of residents.
- To educate Oakville citizens of the rich history of Trafalgar township.
- To celebrate the history of the township as with the Sept 16th celebration at Palermo

• Preservation. The group would like to try and create a local north Oakville museum and historical archive. They are presently trying to restore the public school in Palermo.

The 200th anniversary celebration was held September 16th at four different locations at Palermo.

There were actors dressed in period costume to greet visitors. There were guided tours of the Palermo cemetery. In the public school there were photo exhibits, displays and artefacts. Outside there were blacksmith and milking demonstrations.

The Palermo United church was open and tours were led by costumed interpreters who interpreted the history and answered questions about the church.

# From the Archives submitted by Brenda Whitlock

#### FROM THE ARCHIVES

In the September 2005 issue of The Journal I asked whether anyone had information about the sculptures done by Canadian sculptor E. B. Cox and believed to be located at a school in Milton. These have now been located, thanks to our eagle-eyed editor, Bruce Carlin. They are at the Trillium section of the E. C. Drury complex. Ed and I located seven and took appropriate photographs. Some of them are not in very good condition and perhaps efforts should be made to restore them. It is interesting that we have, in our midst, sculptures by a major Canadian artist. I hope they become more widely known.

Many thanks to Jim Dills for donating a copy of the book "The Badges and Uniforms of the Lorne Scots (Peel, Dufferin and Halton Regiments) over two centuries, 1800-2000" to the Archives. This is a valuable addition to our collection.

We would also like to thank John McDonald for donating a booklet "The Blacksmith in Eighteenth-Century Williamsburg; an Account of his Life and Times and his Craft". We are always interested in collecting any paper items relating to blacksmithing. We have had a request for information on the local activities of the Loyal Orange Lodge No. 2385. We have very little information on this. Jim Dills has managed to cull some from the pages of "The Canadian Champion" but if anyone has things such as membership lists, photographs etc. we would be delighted to see them. The information can then be scanned or photocopied and put in the files as a permanent and valuable addition to the collection.

A request was received from the Ontario Heritage Trust from a researcher working on Historic Buildings who seemed to be querying the very existence of Hugh Foster! I hope we have set her mind at rest with the help of Alex Cooke's research and a scan of the copy of the original letter from Hugh Foster donating the land to the County.

We have also been dealing with a request from a lady in Lansing, Michigan who seems to want to buy everything ever published on Milton. I haven't been able to find out exactly why - work proceeds on this request.

In the last report I mentioned we had been contacted by a great-great grandson of Dr. Freeman Clarkson. He e-mailed us a complete genealogy

of the Freeman family bringing it right up-to-date and including many photographs.

We received wonderful photographs of fruit gathering at the Hartley fruit farm in the early years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The donation also included a photograph of the Hartley house at the corner of Bell and Mary. We thank Marie Howden for this donation.

Joan Chisholm donated typewritten pages compiled by T.A.H. (T. A. Hutchinson?) of the stories of Jim "Sheeney" Shepherd, taxi driver and raconteur. Having heard much of this gentleman it is nice to receive some of the stories!

Glen Turner is researching baseball in Milton and Al Kiernan of Home Hardware is researching his store in order to produce a booklet about it for the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Much help is being given by Jim Dills and Marsha Waldie.

A request has been received from a descendent of the Corner and Zimmerman families. As most of you know, Thomas Corner was hanged at the Milton jail for the murder of two women. Work is proceeding on this request. The corner family recently held a family reunion in Burlington and were on hand at the September meeting of the Historical Society. Jim Dills was able to share with the family information from articles of the time.

Many thanks to all members who have helped in answering these many requests.



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Our invited guest speaker for the May meeting was Ron Saila. Ron is a resident of Campbellville and has a great interest in local military of the early 1800's. He partakes in battle re-enactments across the province dressed in period soldiers uniforms.

Ron spoke to us in particular about the Incorporated Militia of Upper Canada (IMUC) who were the first regiment made of Canadians. This regiment included pioneers who were skilled tradesmen and were well paid and were the people who opened the way for the military. The pioneers were the only group of the military who wore beards.

The pioneers were equipped with a number of tools that were critical to their role. Squaring axes were very effective tools used for early construction. The bell hook was used for clearing trails through heavy bush. The pioneers also carried with them saws very much like the ones we still use. They carried with them muskets with bayonets

Ron debunked a myth about the reason that the British wore red-coats. This colour was chosen not for its ability to hide blood from battle wounds but because the red dye was the least expensive.

Rifle regiments usually wore green riding jackets. Ron dressed in his military costume that he uses for re-enactments and brought with him many of the tools used by members of the regiment, some of which were original tools. This talk was very enjoyable for all.

April meeting – Ron Avery spoke about the genealogy of the Little Family in Milton. Jack Little operated a saddlery shop at 205 Main Street where the McQuaig insurance Co. is presently located.

June – Pot luck dinner. There were about 30 members who enjoyed themselves at this year's event.

#### Niagara Bus Tour

A busload of MHS members and other interested parties travelled down to the Niagara region June 3rd for a day of history appreciation, wine tasting and some shopping.

The weather was inclement but participants did not let this get in the way. We arrived in Niagara on the Lake as our first stop and visited the variety of shops. The group had lunch in town before departing to visit the Morningstar Mills flour mill located at the very picturesque Decew Falls in St. Catharines. This is an operating grist mill that was restored and is operated by a group of volunteers. The mill is strategically located on a waterfall on the Niagara escarpment. Water is piped to a turbine that spins from the flow of falling water and through a system of gears turns a drive shaft

that is connected to a system of large belts that power a grinding wheel and other equipment in the mill. The mill dates back to 1872 and was built on land owned by Robert Chappel.

This site also contains a beautiful stone home that has been restored from a dilapidated condition and has reclaimed its past beauty.

A drive shed complements the Mill and historic home. Mr. John Bott, a member of the Ontario Artists Blacksmith Association demonstrated nail making the way it was done in the 1800's and talked about some pieces of machinery used in the shop for demonstration purposes to local school groups.

Our next destination was the village of Jordan. In its heyday Jordan was an important port of trade for local produce from the Niagara region. Lake steamers could travel unrestricted to the harbour. When the railroads came through later in the 1800' the shipping trade declined. Jordan is the location of the first Mennonite community in Ontario.

Today there are a number of stores including antiques, furniture, native art work and much more. The village also has a historical museum featuring displays of mennonite artwork known as Fraktur which combines embroidery and symbols. On the site there is also an original stone

school house restored to circa 1905 classroom complete with desks, maps, school supplies and an interpreter to lead you. There is also the pioneer home of Jordan's Mennonite leader, Jacob Fry, a Pennsylvania mennonite. His original home of 1815 has been moved to the site. There are two small cemeteries sitting on a bank that overlooks the river. The setting is very scenic and a fitting memory to the first settlers of Jordan.

The final stop on our tour was to the Mancotta Wines retail store where we were treated to wine tasting displays and a store full of wines to suit everyone's taste at a fair price. Thanks go to Marsha for organizing this bus tour and making sure we were comfortable, well supplied with sweets and as our tour guide kept well informed about all the local historic sites.

#### Milton's 150th Anniversary

2007 will mark the 150th anniversary of the incorporation of the Town of Milton. In preparation for this event a History and Culture Sub-Committee has been meeting to plan events. Marsha Waldie has been attending these meetings to represent our society.

There are plans for this sub-committee to produce a coffee table book about Milton Industries and Organisations. This book will contain advertisements and one or two page write ups on companies along with photographs. The funds raised will be used to help finance 150th anniversary celebrations.

There is also support for the idea of a traveling historical display which could be placed at locations such as libraries, schools, etc. There is interest in the holding of Jasper Martin days and a Master calendar which would be used to track all special events organised to celebrate Milton's 150th anniversary.

Jim Dills and Gloria Brown have produced a Celebration of 150 years of Milton's History anniversary calendar which goes on sale in September of 2006. This calendar will be a 15 month calendar and includes historical photographs of Milton local scenes, individuals along with snippets of information for each month. Keep your eyes open for it in the fall!

## From the Archives submitted by Brenda Whitlock

#### FROM THE ARCHIVES

We would like to thank Marsha Waldie for donating a copy of "Halton's pages of the past" by Gwen Clarke. This book, published in 1955, is a history of the early days of settlement in Halton County. It will be placed in our small but growing library.

Ever since the Milton Historical Society has had a web page and our archival collection has appeared on the "Halton's Historical and Newspaper Records" web page, we have been receiving many more requests for information from far and wide.

Recently we have had requests from Oregon regarding the wife of Joseph Bowes (who donated the land for Bowes Church, now the Masonic Lodge on Highway 25). Also for information re-

garding Levi Willson, the 1st Sheriff of Halton County from a woman in California who is descended from Levi's eldest son. Another request has come from a woman in Des Moines, Iowa for old local Milton recipes for things that could be served at a party being held to celebrate the birth of a grandchild who is a descendant of the Hemstreet/Blain families. We found candy recipes in a farm ledger from the Chisholm family which we e-mailed to her together with a note that we would not be responsible for the results if they turned out badly! Since then we have e-mailed much information to her regarding the Hemstreet/Blain families. We have also had a request from a descendant of the Galbraith family. A request has also been received for information on Matthew Clements with regard to the Clements house on Trafalgar Road.

There has been a request from a graduate student at the University of Waterloo who is working on his (From the Archives continued)

thesis the focus of which is the Town of Milton. He requested permission to use two of our pictures of Main Street, one from the early part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century and one from the 1990s.

We have had a request from a descendant of the O'-Connor family for information on the Thompson House. Ms. Smith's uncle was born in one of the apartments there in 1924. She sent us an extremely generous donation and also gave us information about her grandparents, Jim and Edith O'Connor, who lived on the 4<sup>th</sup> Line in the old Beaty house (pictured in the Halton Atlas).

We also want to thank the Directors of the Halton Regional Museum who have had our original 1877 Halton Atlas professionally restored in thanks for allowing them to borrow it so that they could produce exact copies for sale in order to raise funds for the Museum.

Many thanks to Judy Houston who kindly let us borrow a series of photographs taken by Eva Houston during World War I some of which will be appearing in our new calendar and also in the book on WWI soon to be published.

A man who lives on Robertson Crescent, is doing serious research on the railways in Milton. If anyone has a cache of information etc. regarding this subject, I am sure he would be most interested in seeing it.

An e-mail request came from a person interested in having our suggestions for suitable historic buildings in Milton as a background for wedding photographs. A committee of Marsha Waldie and Brenda Whitlock dealt with this request promptly and efficiently!

We are putting together a display for the summer and fall months honouring the local Women's Institutes. If you have any memorabilia, interesting photographs, ideas etc. regarding this please contact us.

Recent requests have come in from Colorado for information on the Willmott family and also from a man working in the Alberta oil patch regarding his great-grageat(??) grandfather, Dr. Clarkson Freeman. I think he will be able to give us more information than we can give him.

#### **Blacksmith Shop News**

There have been several blacksmith courses held this spring including both single day and two and a half day sessions. The blacksmith shop was also open for the recent Arts festival and there was a steady stream of visitors to the shop!



#### 167 Mary Street home relocates

The yellow cottage at 167 Mary street was recently moved to Robert street in order to make room for the expansion of the Milton Town Hall. This home is an example of a late nineteenth century style Ontario Cottage. It consists of four large rooms, a small room plus kitchen and bathroom. 167 Mary street was first registered in 1862 to Thomas Foster (Son of Hugh Foster and Sarah Foster (His second wife). The home is believed to have been constructed around 1886.

155 Mary Street is a brick home and it was also part of the Foster survey and it will be moving to Bell street later this year.

On a related note, the Milton Historical Society received a letter from the town of Milton in response to concerns about the demolition of the stone home at the Northeast corner of Tremaine and Derry (cont.)

that was demolished in 2005. At a meeting of Heritage Milton and the Town the following safeguards were put in place.

- The applicant must provide a recent photograph of the building/structure that is being proposed to be demolished to Town staff. Staff will then forward this photo to the Demolition Sub-Committee in order for them to be able to precisely identify the building/structure to be demolished.
- Prior to signing off on a demolition permit, a site visit will be conducted by two members of the Demolition Sub-Committee. Following the site visit, both members will be required to sign off on the permit. In addition, there are back-up members in the event that one or both members are unable to conduct a site visit.
- If one member is not in agreement with the other over the proposed demolition, then the demolition permit will be brought before Heritage Milton for the entire committee to make a final decision as a whole.

More than 95% of all births in Canada took place at home.



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#### 2006 Milton Heritage Awards

The Milton Historical Society and Heritage Milton celebrated the Milton Heritage Awards Sunday afternoon, Feb 26th at Hugh Foster Hall.

The Milton Historical Society presented three awards including an educational award to Jim Dills and Tony Ferrante for the Main Street video production. This video features narration by Jim Dills and the filming and film editing by Tony Ferrante.

This production includes interesting stories and historical photos about the people, buildings and events that shaped Milton's Main Street over the years.

Ann Kornuta received a visual arts award for her paintings of Milton's downtown heritage buildings.

These paintings were produced with vibrant colours and portray our old buildings in a novel art form. Ann has produced some 40 paintings of Milton's heritage buildings. Thanks to all those volunteers who made this event a success and thanks to our elected VIP's for helping in the presentations of the awards.

#### **Recent Guest Speakers**

Our January meeting featured sculptor Nancy Cuttle speaking about her collection of figurines on the topic "A celebration of women in the 20th century". Nancy is a talented sculptor who created the set of 10 sculptures in honour of the new millenium. Each sculpture portrays a woman in front of a door dressed in the style of that particular decade.

Nancy used a slide presentation as she took the audience through the various steps of producing the clay art (firing the clay and painting) and her commentary about the role of Canadian women in each of the decades. It was a very interesting and educational look down memory lane.

## Feb 2006 Empire Loyalists Celebrate Early Events in our History. (submitted by Ken Lamb)

At our Feb. 16th general meeting members enjoyed a colourful description of a crucial event in the history of the United States and Canada.

Our speaker was Fred Hayward, a former Miltonian, and a key figure in the United Empire Loyalists Association of Canada; he is chairman of its education/outreach committee. Mr. Hayward, an Oakville resident since 1963, began his talk as an expert, explaining the results of the Americans' "uprising" against the British. He then morphed into one of he "loyalists" who fled north after the fighting. (cont. p. 3)

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In the latter role he literally stepped out of his pants and shed his jacket to emerge in 18th century garb. He spoke in two distinct voices, one for the observer, another for the participant.

He explained that tens of thousands of Loyalists arrived in what is now Eastern Canada; the Maritimes and present-day Quebec and Ontario. They produced profound changes in all areas.

In November, 1789 Lord Dorchester, Governor-in-Chief, British North America, identified those entitled to call themselves "Loyalists:. People who had resided before 1783 in what is now the United States and later left for British territory were entitled to place the capital letters UE after their names. UE alluded to "The Unity of the Empire". Descendants of the original Loyalists were given the same entitlement.

Our speaker signs himself "Fred H. Hayward UE". His ancestors were among the Loyalists who arrived at Phillipsburg, Quebec.

Membership in the Emprire Loalists' Association is not restricted to Loyalists' descendants. People whose interests are only social or historical are also welcome to join.

#### Milton Time Capsule (submitted by Jim Dills) Canadian Champion February 1908

Mr. Charles Clarke, late clerk of the Ontario Legislature, has issued a very readable historical work entitled "Sixty years in Upper Canada". It was June of 1844 that Mr. Clark arrived at Port Robinson on the Welland canal and very interesting are his reminiscences of those pioneer days.

"Food" he says, "partook of a simplicity similar to that of dress. Salt meat, eggs and potatoes were the stable edibles after bread. Fresh meat in country parts was at some seasons a comparative luxury. Veal was obtainable in spring, mutton in summer and beef or pork in the fall and winter months, while poultry was generally marketed as soon as possible after fattening stubbles were exhausted. "Fancy groceries were actual luxuries. I have seen currants sold at three Yorkers (37 1/2 cents a pound) and raisins, of a poorer quality than we now see often commanded a 'quarter'. Tea was dear, although duties were low and frequently brought a dollar, and coffee, cheaper in proportion was more freely used.

"Native fruits were cheap. Peaches were bought off the tree in the Niagara district for twenty-five cents per bushel: apples had little commercial value, and cherries could be had in the rural areas in



the Niagara district at twenty-five cents 'a tree' the purchaser picking off the fruit. "Ale and beer were obtainable, of drinkable quality, in town, but little of either reached country parts. Cider was often used, the most desirable being 'frozen' so that the watery element was largely eliminated and a very potent intoxicant produced. Whiskey, the common drink of the county, could be had at any of the numerous distilleries by the barrel, at sixteen or twenty cents per gallon, and there were few 'bees', 'loggings' or 'raisings' at which it was not more freely dispensed than water, and there was a prevalent opinion that it was much more wholesome. "Venison, now a luxury, was a common article of food in many sections, and obtainable at three or four cents per pound. Maple sugar and molasses were as common an article for trading transactions in country stores as home-made straw hats, butter, tallow, dried apples, timothy seed, woolen socks, whittled butter ladles, bowls and axe-helves.

Mr. Clarke discourses entertainingly of the farm stock of those days. "If cows were 'mixed', swine, the port factors, were as ugly as that famous possessor of them who drove them pell-mell into the sea, and wore manes as do the wild boars of the German forest. Sheep were of a degenerate Merino breed, small in size and of little value for mutton, and the selling price, minus the skin, was often as low as one dollar the carcass. Cattle were sometimes large when at four of five years of age, they reached maturity, but even then were bony coarse and more of active than adipose tendencies: This is some of Mr. Clarke's early history. He would probably say himself that it is of less value than the review of political events which follows. That may be so, for many a reminiscence of Legislative halls has been gathered with the pages of this book. But the records of the simple home life of bygone days should never lack for listeners.

#### World War I manuscript progressing.

Under the guiding hand of Jim Dills, a manuscript about the Milton area soldiers of World War I is nearing completion.

The book is divided into several parts. One section includes the military records from Ottawa of those soldiers killed in action. There is also a section on Canada's involvement in the Great war. The community of Milton organized fund raising for the war effort and a part of the book looks at these efforts. There were two cenotaphs erected in Milton and Haltonville to commemorate the soldiers who lost their lives in World War I and these events are also included.

There were an estimated 350 individuals from the Milton area who were members of the war effort under the banner of the 164th battalion. The manuscript is approximately 200 pages. A number of volunteers have been helping collect photographs of local area soldiers from WWI. If you have any such photos, please forward to Jim Dills by April 15th.

- Copies of two local family histories (The Huffman's and the Hardy's).

The Oral History Committee members have been very busy collecting histories of local citizens.



#### J.M. Denyes donation

The MHS has acquired a needlepoint chair built by J.M. Denyes as a gesture of thanks to the naming of a school in his honour. James Malcolm Denyes was a popular Halton school board inspector who served from 1913 to 1938. The chair was donated to the school in September 1957.
