#### **Ancestors Day in Milton**

Milton's Pioneer and Evergreen cemeteries welcomed visitors recently to meet some of Milton's famous citizens from the past.

Volunteers from the Milton Historical Society were dressed in period costume and stood by the grave of the person who they were representing. The interpreters greeted visitors and provided a short biography about the person that they were representing.

Some of the famous former citizens represented included Peter McKay, Dr. McCutcheon, Miss Bastedo, Margaret Maxted, Edith Dick and several others.

In addition to the costumed interpreters there were self guided maps available. There were also interpretative signs placed around the cemetery with a short bibliography for the person. The Acton Brass band played music to celebrate the occasion.

The highlight of the day was a memorial service at the grave of P.L. Robertson. Rev. Howard Sullivan spoke about P.L. and his role in Milton's history. A special brass plaque to recognize P.L. as the inventor of the socket head screw was unveiled. Special guests included PL's daughter Victoria Hobb and grandson Ron Hobb. Mayor Krantz represented the town

and spoke about the significant roles played by our ancestors. Ruth and Don Taylor prepared a display with old newspaper articles and a family tree for her ancestors.

Many thanks to Marsha Waldie for coordinating Ancestors Day and to all the volunteers who assisted with the day's events.

This special event was one of the activities that the MHS has taken on for Milton's 150th anniversary.


# 150th Update

#### Milton Streets Book arrives this Fall!

John Challinor II and Jim Dills have teamed up again to produce a book about the streets, neighbourhoods, surveys, villages and towns that make up Milton. Milton Streets is a book about the names of the places we all know so well in our town. There is a short description about the person, object or place that was used in the naming of the 600 streets and locations in the book.

The hard cover book is 128 pages in length. There are 60 beautiful full page colour photos of well known rural and urban street scenes taken during the various seasons.

The photographs were taken by five Milton area photographers, Mike Streeter, Peter Burian. Grant Rushton, Mike Schramm and Bob McDonald. The 600 locations include both historic neighbourhoods as well as some streets yet to be built.

The book will be released in early November at a retail price of \$40.00. Plans are in the works for book signings. This book will make a nice Chistmas gift for family or friends. Milton Streets is about our ancestors, the development of Milton and the beauty of the homes and roads in the community.



## St. Peter's Mission submitted by Ed Goodall

Irish immigrants began to settle in the 8th and 9th line area of Trafalgar township as early as 1818. In 1819 two young settlers, Bartholomew O'Connor and Charles O'Hara walked the forty miles to Dundas to persuade a Father O'Reilly to come to their colony to celebrate Mass at Mr. O'Hara's cabin on the 9th line. In 1823 a log church was constructed on site six of the 9th line, donated by a Mr. Dan Highland. Soon a large congregation assembled with people coming from as far as Brampton and Georgetown areas. A meal of roast venison and potatoes with fresh baked bread would be prepared to be enjoyed after the service.

Many of the families are buried in the cemetery adjacent to the church, like Catherine Robinson from Owens County, Ireland who died in 1875 at the age of 52, pre-deceased by her husband James who died in 1869 aged 53 and Kelly Keevan from Kings county, Ireland who died in 1857 aged 57. The whole of the McCarron family lie here, with Erwin who died in 1886 aged 80, son John in 1893 aged 49, William in 1890 aged 6 months, Susan in 1849 aged 8 and Catherine in 1885 aged 48 years.

As the 1820's drew to an end the land under cultivation was producing a poor yield of crops and many of the men in the area left to seek employment elsewhere. In 1826 the digging of the Welland canal got underway which provided steady employment and 25 young men were lured away by the prospect of earn-



ing a steady wage.

In 1850 the original Chapel was replaced by another frame church. The congregation then consisted of about 50 families. By 1880 the railway age had arrived precipitating the exodus from rural areas and leaving only nine families in the ninth line area.

The present St. Peters mission with its brick structure was built in 1882 but the Church was forced to close in 1890 due to a declining congregation. In 1938 the church was re-opened when the Holy Rosary, Milton was first established in the Parish. In 1982 the church received its third reconstruction when it was moved back from the road and given a new foundation with further renovations completed in 1995.

#### Chef at Home with Reni McDonald

The earliest Thanksgiving in Canada goes back to the English explorer, Martin Frobisher, who had been trying to find a northern passage to the Orient. Although he did not succeed, he did establish a settlement in present day Newfoundland. In 1858 he held a formal ceremony, to give thanks for surviving the long journey. This is believed to be the first Thanksgiving in Canada and the first in North America. Other settlers continued with these ceremonies.

Over the years many dates were used for Thanksgiving Day. In 1957, Parliament proclaimed ... "A Day of General Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the bountiful harvest with which Canada has been blessed ... to be observed on the second Monday in October."

As with any celebration and holiday, food plays a big part and on Thanksgiving Day, families and friends gather for the traditional dinner including turkey and pumpkin pie. The following recipe can be prepared a day ahead and then baked just before serving. Enjoy!

#### Squash Casserole

5 1/2 cups butternut squash, cooked and mashed 1/2 cup finely chopped onion 1/2 cup melted butter 1/2 breadcrumbs 1 tbsp. sugar salt and pepper to taste 2 eggs. beaten

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Combine squash, onion, 1/4 cup of the melted butter, 1/4 cup breadcrumbs, sugar, salt and pepper. Stir in beaten eggs and turn into a greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Drizzle remaining butter over the top and sprinkle with breadcrumbs. Bake, uncovered for 45 minutes or until centre is set. Serves 8-10.

Sam Bews was in the clothing business for many years and had a store on Main street in Milton. Following are some sales taken from the store ledger records dated in September, 1897. You may recognize some of the names.

R. S. Hemstreet - 1 doz pairs black gloves \$10.50 Chas. Jones Sr. – Suit \$ 18.00 J. M. Bastedo – To repair vest \$0.28 Mr. Chisholm – Tie \$0.40 Ross Armour – Suit \$15.00 Archy McDowell – Cloth overalls \$0.75 Rev. D. W. Snider – Repair pants \$0.50 Paid Nightwatchman – \$0.60 Samuel Hetherington – \$3.25 for pair overalls D. Featherston \$28.70 – For 2 1/2 cothouade Rev. David Darling \$16.00 – Suit Mrs. J. Hawthorne \$2.50 – cloth trimmings

The archives is a treasure trove of interesting historical artifacts. Items include a Certificate for Regular Attendance for Thomas Crozier, dated Dec 23, 1864. We have also a 1909 document from the Board of Trustees of the Milton Public School a certificate of condolence to Mrs. McDowell on the death of her husband, Thomas McDowell. The archives are open Wednesdays and Saturdays or by appointment.

The official launch of the Milton Historical Society's newest book, "Milton Streets" took place November 10th at the Waldie Blacksmith Shop.

Mirella Marshall greeted guests and thanked the authors, photographers, financial backers and others associated with the project.

Authors Jim Dills and John Challinor II proudly unveiled the publication. This project was a number of years in the making and we thank them for their persistence.

Thanks go to Andrin Homes, Century Grove Homes, Royalpark Homes and the Tiger Jeet Singh family for their financial backing.

Long time member Jessie Hamilton was given a copy of the book in recognition of her role as the person who came up with the original idea as well as her research assistance.

The five area photographers who provided the sixty colour photographs used in "Milton Streets" were in attendance. They were recognized for the quality of their photographs and for allowing the pictures to be used in the book at no charge.

Representatives from the publisher Boston Mills Press also attended the book launch.

This hard cover book contains descriptions and photographs of the people and places used in the naming of the 600 streets, surveys and neighbourhoods and hamlets and villages that form the municipality of Milton.

Guests to the launch were able to have their personal copies signed by both the authors and the photographers.

There have been numerous book signing events at the Milton Mall as well as other retail outlets. The books are priced at \$40.00. MHS members can purchase the book at Waldie's blacksmith shop at a member's discount price of \$36.00. Sales of the book have been brisk. Profits from the book sales will go towards funding ongoing Historical Society activities.

#### MHS General Meetings

Wallace Gray was our guest speaker for October. His topic was on the Pioneer Use of Water. Wallace grew up in the area near Erin on a farm and had a career in manufacturing including work on the Avro Arrow. The pioneers used water power for a range of purposes including grinding grain, sawing lumber and making flour. Most of these mills are now gone but some have been restored and put to new uses

such as restaurants There were a number of different inventions developed to harness the power of water. These took the form of the well known water wheels as well as turbines. Water wheels were about half the efficiency of the turbines in converting the weight of the water into a rotating force.

Wallace spoke about some of the local mills and their points of interest. In the Alliston area, there is the Nicholston Dam and a 100 horsepower turbine on the Nottawasaga river. The Aberfoyle mill or Puslinch mill is located on highway 6 north and operated from 1859 to 1952. In 1867 James Mullen won a gold medal at the World Exhibition in Paris, France for oatmeal produced at the mill.

Hilton Falls was the location of a water powered sawmill built in 1835 but it was not successful and closed in 1836.

Alex McCann built a sawmill in 1838 in Campbellville. The large quantity of trees in the area provided an ample supply for the mill. Unfortunately once the trees were cut the water table lowered and creeks would go dry and some of the mills would then have to close

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority estimates that there were 65 mills on the Credit River during the period 1860 to 1880. (cont. next page)

In 1846 Gooderham & Worts built a mill near Hillsburg which included a 24 foot diameter overshot wheel that was 75% efficient.

During the 1940's and 1950's electric power arrived in many parts of Ontario and this was the end for many grist mills. At least one enterprising owner purchased a grist mill and built a better generator and sold electric power for a time. Eventually the plant was sold to Ontario Hydro.

Wallace's talk highlighted the important role of water power and the enterprising pioneers who harnessed it.

#### Milton Remembers the Wars

Our November guest speaker was Ken Lamb, author of several local history books including Milton Remembers Word War II.

Locally, the Royal Canadian Legion actively leads remembrance activities. Poppy sales in the areabring in close to \$45,000 annually. The money is used to purchase wheelchairs and other needs for the veterans. There are currently about 80 veterans at the Milton Legion and about 700 members.

Milton Remembers World War I was released last year and includes records and photographs of local soldiers.

In nearby Guelph, the McCrae house commemorates the life of John McCrae, the doctor and soldier of World War I who penned the famous poem, "In Flanders Fields". In Milton there is a memorial cenotaph and peace gardens. In November 2007 a number of Milton cadets attended the Vimy Ridge memorial in France for remembrance day activities.

The Victoria Cross has been awarded to 94 Canadians since its inception, 70 times in the first war and 16 in the second war with the remainder awarded in other wars. Ontario soldiers have been the recipients for 20 of the total.

Hilda McKinley is a war bride who is active at the Milton Seniors Activity center. She recalls the royal treatment received on ships transporting the war brides overseas and being taken aback by the sheer size of Canada. The brides were not fully briefed about the their new country and ill prepared for the winter. Sometimes they were not welcome as they were considered another mouth to feed. Hilda recalls working on nearby farms harvesting strawberries and tomatoes. In time she adapted to her new country and became active in hobbies and activities such as the Girl Guides. Thanks to Ken for helping us to remember the wars and efforts to preserve

#### Chef at Home with Reni McDonald

Christmas is a time of celebrating with family and friends. We continue to follow our own traditions and customs that have been handed down through the generations as well as starting new ones of our own.

Food plays an integral part during the festive season. Recipes have been exchanged through the years and we all have our favourites. If your family is like mine, they prefer the traditional dishes prepared for Christmas dinner. If you get tired of never-ending turkey sandwiches and soup, here is a recipe for using up the remaining Christmas turkey. It makes an easy dinner and you won't feel like you're having leftovers. Enjoy and Merry Christmas!

#### Turkey Tetrazzini with Almonds

1 tbsp. butter
2 cups sliced mushrooms
1/4 cup chopped shallots (or onions)
1/3 cup flour
2 cups milk (or cream)
2 cups chicken broth
1/3 cup sherry
2 1/2 cups chopped, cooked turkey
1/2 cup freshly grated parmesan
4 cups hot, cooked spaghetti
1/2 cup slivered almonds, toasted
salt and pepper to taste
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
cooking spray
2 tbsp. freshly grated parmesan

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Melt butter in a large pot, over medium heat. Add mushrooms and shallots. Sauté 5 minutes and then stir in flour. Gradually add milk, broth and sherry, stirring with a whisk until blended. Bring to a boil stirring constantly, then reduce heat and simmer for about 8 minutes continuing to stir. Add turkey and 1/2 cup parmesan and cook for one minute. Remove from heat and add pasta, nuts, salt pepper and nutmeg. Spoon mixture into a 3 quart casserole that has been coated with cooking spray and top with remaining parmesan. Bake for 40 minutes. Serves 4 – 6.

## Waldie Reinforcing submitted by Larry Maughan

The above photo is of a piece of the old wall around part of the Waldie Blacksmith Shop, showing the rubble stone construction reinforced with horseshoes. As of Dec/07, this remaining sample was by the south wall back of the "Iron Man". Tom Murison who started the Shop restoration told of his choice of rental equipment to demolish these walls before rebuilding. He could choose a more powerful, compressed air jack hammer, but instead chose an electric jack hammer, expecting the old aged rubble to fall apart. The horseshoe reinforcing made his work more difficult.

These rubble walls were constructed by the Waldie blacksmiths and their employees because the timber frame bottom members at soil level rotted. They would have had many left-over horseshoes. The author also realized that this is around the time that concrete reinforcing was starting. A blacksmith shop is where all things current are discussed. – the blacksmiths would have been aware of this new technology.

To find out more, the author talked to his brother Mike, who was one of three Professional Engineers at Toronto Township before it became Mississauga. He told me of a Bowstring bridge which the engineers recommended against destroying –

rather plaque it. To find it, cross the QEW northbound on Dixie Road. Dixie turns right or east, comes to a stoplight, and turns left. If one continues straight or east 3 or 5 blocks with some wiggles, one reaches a dead end. Park and walk down the path to the 1909 Bowstring bridge crossing the Etobicoke creek which is the border between Mississsaga and Etobicoke or Toronto.

Mike also reported from on-line Wikepedia (when I try I couldn't find this!), an 1850's patent for reinforced concrete railway bridge railings, and a 1880's complete building of reinforced concrete in the U.S. west, built for 20 mule team borax (still sold under that name). The author knew of a 1916 Bowstring bridge (the design is based upon reinforced concrete) in Guelph on Stone Road east. The author also lived by the Caledonia 9 span Bowstring bridge, dated 1927.

Ah! Blacksmiths and their exposure to related technologies!

Historical Tidbit: Research by Jim Dills

From the Canadian Champion Nov 9, 1922

The Milton Worsted Yarn Spinning Mills Co.'s building on Commercial street has for a long time been too small for its needs, has been run with day and night shifts and has had more orders than it could handle. In order to increase its output and add new lines of manufactures, it has bought the shoe factory on Main street from its owner, the Corp. Of Milton. Men are busy now cleaning it out and removing what is left of the old machinery. The Co. will have the interior of the building remodeled at once, with a new floor in the basement and the upper floors strengthened to support a complete outfit of new machinery which it is expected will all be on hand in Feb. after which manufacturing will begin as soon as possible, with a large number of new operators.

She was a member of Grace Anglican Church and for many years an active worker in the W.A. She was interested in music, being a pianist of ability. She was the daughter of George Clarkson and Deborah Teetzel Book and was born at Milton where she lived all her life. She is the last of a long line of Dutch settlers who came to Grimsby in 1798. Surviving besides her husband are four daughters and two sons. The funeral took place from Grace Church on Sat. with interment in Palermo cemetery.





#### Port Hope Beautiful Historic Town

Thirty people hopped on a bus to tour Historic Port Hope recently. The weather was perfect for visiting with sunny skies and nice weather.

Our tour guide Steve Shap, a life long resident of Port Hope made our visit most interesting and enjoyable.

Highlights of the tour included a tour of the Capitol Theatre which is Canada's only remaining Atmospheric Theatre. It was built in the 1930s in the design of a medieval castle on the exterior of the building and inside the walls are painted to show landscapes of trees and hills and at the front of the Theatre are two watch towers on either side of the stage.

Steve told us stories of some of Port Hope's famous

citizens including a Joseph Scriven who came to the town in 1820 from Dublin, Ireland. He was a religious man and a bit eccentric and also had his share of misfortune including a fiancée who drowned on the eve of their wedding and a wife who died from pneumonia one week after being baptised in the waters of nearby Rice Lake. Joseph Scriven wrote a poem that became a famous church hymn "What a Friend we have in Jesus".

We also learned the story of Lieutenant Colonel Arthur Williams who commanded the Midland Battalion at the Battle of Batoche, Northwest Territories against the Louis Riel and the Metis. The Midlanders broke through the lines during the battle and this marked the turning point in the battle. Unfortunately, Lt. Colonel Williams succumbed to sickness shortly after the battle. In recognition of his role at Batoche, some 10,000 people attended the funeral. A monument was unveiled by Sir John A. Macdonald.

#### Chef at Home with Reni McDonald

With the hot, hazy days of summer here at last, we look towards easy to prepare meals that won't heat up the kitchen. There is one ingredient I'm sure most of you have a box or two of in your pantry and with it, you can make an endless variety of salads, appetizers, entrees, relishes and desserts.

In 1897, Pearl B. Wait, a carpenter and cough medicine manufacturer from New York, developed a fruit flavoured version of gelatin. His wife, May Davis Wait, named it Jell-O. The first flavours were orange, lemon, strawberry and raspberry. In 1899, Wait sold the business to a neighbour for \$450.00. In 1905 Jell-O gelatin production began in Canada. In the early 1900's Jell-O was served to immigrants entering Ellis Island as a "Welcome to America." Gelled salads became very popular around the 1930's. This led to the introduction of Lime Jell-O, a flavour well suited to salads. To-day there are more than 158 products sold under the Jell-O brand name which belongs to USA-based Kraft Foods.

#### Great Aunt Luise's Jellied Salad

1 large package of lime Jell-O

1 1/2 cups boiling water

1 cup sour cream

1 - 8 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained

1 cup diced cucumber, peeled and seeded

1 tsp. worchestershire sauce

Dissolve Jell-O in boiling water. Chill until it begins to thicken. Stir in the rest of the ingredients. Pour into a mold or bowl and let set well before serving. Enjoy!

#### Jasper Martin sculpture a 150th tribute

Inspired by Milton's 150th anniversary and using her artistic training as a sculptor Nancy Cuttle has created a sculpture of Jasper Martin and recently displayed it at the Main street festival in June and at the June Potluck dinner.

The sculpture depicts Jasper Martin arms crossed and with a proud look on his face. The clay sculpture stands about 18 inches tall on a piece of limestone from the Bruce Street school. It took three months to complete.

There are no known drawings or paintings of Jasper Martin and he passed away before the discovery of the camera so there was no image to work from. Nancy looked at images of the descendants of Jasper Martin to come up with her understanding of how he may have looked. (cont. next page)



# Milton's 150th Celebrations underway!

The year 2007 marks the 150th anniversary of the incorporation of the Town of Milton. The celebrations kicked off New Year's eve with the traditional bell ringing ceremony at Victoria Park. Special invited quests included the designer of the 150th logo Michelle Job and the Milly the Millstone mascot.

The Milton Historical Society helped to recognize the occasion at the Mayor's Levee on New Year's day with members dressing as former prominent Miltonians and providing short biographies on their life accomplishments.

The former Miltonians were selected from the very earliest history up to the more recent. Jasper Martin played the role of his ancestor and founder of Milton and by no coincidence also with the same name. The other members included Sarah Priscilla Waldie, PL Robertson, Mayor Mike Ledwith, the mayor for Milton's Centennial celebrations, Elizabeth Harrison, Jane Darling, Edith Dick, Margaret Maxted, Captain AC Bastedo, Mayor George Brown and Myrtle Fields

## Robertson Socket Head Fastener A Great Canadian Invention!

CBC television held a special production early in January dedicated to the 50 Greatest Canadian Inventions. A sample of Canadians from across Canada were given the chance to vote on what they believed were the greatest Canadian inventions.

The program counted down from the 50th invention and moved forward to inventions with ascending numbers of votes. I must admit I missed the first few minutes of the show and the countdown was to 48 when I turned on the television. To my initial dismay when I saw the Ardox Spiral Nail selected as the 46th greatest invention for a moment I thought the Robertson Fastener might have gone before the nail. I hoped not!

I continued watching with anticipation and watched the Ski-Doo, the Electron microscope, the Canadarm go down. We were down to the top 10 greatest inventions! As it turned out the PL Robertson screw was voted in as the 8th Greatest Canadian Invention. Not bad for a device invented almost 100 years ago. There is a project for 2008, the 100th anniversary of the Robertson fastener!

A number of famous Canadians gave their personal reviews on the inventions including hometown astronaut Chris Hadfield on the qualities of the Robertson fastener. A fun show to watch!

#### Milton FD History Illuminates

Ron Townsend shared the results of his research efforts into the history of the Milton Fire Department at our January meeting.

The history of many Ontario towns and cities includes some significant fires in their downtown areas in the early stages of the town's development. Milton has been no stranger to these fires. Jasper Martin's original wood grist mill was an early victim of fire and was replaced by the stone grist mill in the 1850's.

In the early years there were volunteer fire brigades and fire preparedness by-laws. Buildings had to have 2 buckets full of clean water dedicated for fire fighting. In the year of Milton's incorporation By Law # 12 was passed and Milton's first fire brigade and hook and ladder company was formed with powers to conscript people to help fight fires and fines of 5 schillings for those who refused.

Milton's first hand pumper unit dated back to 1855. It was basically a water pump on wheels, water was poured into a basin and hand pumping created the pressure to shoot the water out the end of the hose. Other notable fire apparatus purchased included a 1915 Buick for carrying hoses, a 1922 International which is still mobile and in 1946 a Fargo was purchased.

A major development in 1888 was the opening of Milton's municipal water system. A reservoir was established up on the escarpment off of main street along with a pipeline feeding into Milton. The elevation of the escarpment ensured that the water pressure in Milton was very high.

The alarm for early fires was the Town Hall Bell. Once telephone service came to Milton , number 100 was the Fire Emergency Call number. When this number was dialed, there would be 7 operators listening in on the details and they in turn would call the firefighter homes.

A number of MHS members like Marsha Waldie and Lynne Bundy Davis shared some of their early memories of their fathers who were Milton Firefighters years ago. Thanks Ron for the history!

#### Cemetery Art

Cemetery Art was the subject of our February meeting. Guest Speaker Regina Haggo from the Dundas Valley School of Art spoke about the symbolism of art on headstones. There are two symbols that have figured prominently in artwork of early headstones. The weeping willow tree was a common image that symbolized both mourning and new life. Clasped hands were also common and they symbolized the Christian belief of the resurrection and connection with heaven. Regina's talk was full of detailed insights into many other symbols of cemetery art.

#### History of Home Hardware

Al Kiernan and Mary Varley from Milton Home Hardware and Building Supplies shared their store history at our March meeting. As part of celebrations for the 150th anniversary, Al spearheaded a project to research the history of the Hardware Store from its earliest beginnings to the present. Milton Home Hardware is one of the oldest retail stores in the Town of Milton. The history of the hardware store includes the names and photographs of the owners beginning with Duncan and Adam McKay in the 1880's. The store started operations on Main street and included several moves including the Milton Mall and present Steeles Avenue locations. (Cont.)

The book includes the home locations of the store owners, early advertisements and the history of the Milton Home Hardware Logo. A list of all current and past store employees includes over 350 names. A special anniversary display has been constructed to show early tools, products, advertisements and other historic artifacts of the store. The display is at the blacksmith shop and will be moved to a variety of locations to highlight Milton's special anniversary. Congratulations to Home Hardware on their anniversary project.

#### Dr. James Cobban

Milton's Pioneer Doctor Buried in Bronte St. Cemetery: part of a story published By J. Dills which appeared in our April 7, 1986 Journal.


Dr. James Cobban is one of the town's pioneers who rests in the Pioneer Cemetery on Bronte St. Born in Aberdeen Scotland, Sept. 27. 1802, he was admitted to the degree of Master of Arts at the age of 16. During the time he attended lectures in medicine he was also an apprenticed pupil of Alexander Irvine M. D. from 1816 until the end of his curriculum.

He went to London to complete his medical education and on Oct. 5, 1821 he became a member of the Royal College of Surgeons.

Dr. Cobban practiced in Greenland then went to Jamaica where he practiced for 9 yrs arriving in Canada in 1832.

In Nov. 1832 he was "gazetted" and announced that he had taken up residence on the 16 Mile Creek and would serve residents of the area. His home was on Commercial St. at the south east corner of Heslop and he farmed the land in that area.

At this time he was the 3<sup>rd</sup> pioneer doctor between the city of Hamilton and Toronto, the two others being at St. Ann and near Port Credit. Dr. Cobban died Feb. 21, 1857 in the same year Milton was incorporated as a Town.

#### What's In A Name?

This Idea started many years with our member Jessie Hamilton beginning the process. Since then Jim and John have documented and continued adding to the Towns Street and Neighbourhood data base.

-Alexander Crescent (Dempsey) Named in 2000 for William Alexander (1864-1951), a local farmer and grain merchant who served as a Milton Councillor in 1897 and 1898. He also served as a school trustee in 1913.

Dempsey: This neighbourhood was named for a prominent farming family, whose family members were led by patriarch John Dempsey, a native of Ireland who filed his petition for land at York in Dec. 1818 and received his Crown land title by July 1836. This area is bounded by Hwy 401 to the north, the Canadian National Railway tracks to the south, Thompson Rd. to the west and James Snow Parkway to the east. (cont. p.7)

#### Chef at Home with Reni McDonald # 1

(A new addition to the Journal Thanks to Reni McDonald and enjoy)

Many changes have occurred in the field of cooking since the days of our grandmothers.

Meals were prepared according to what was locally in season. Until electric refrigeration in the early 1900's keeping food fresh was not an easy task. To make food supplies last through winter, meat was canned, cured, salted and smoked. Fruits and vegetables were preserved or stored in a root cellar. Commercial canning of fruits and vegetables was introduced in the late 1800's.

At this time of the year the production of maple syrup is very much in season and popular as a sweet-ener in many recipes. I have adapted the following recipe to reflect modern ingredients. For example: to-day's flour is of a much lighter consistency and eggs are larger. Enjoy!

#### Maple Raisin Muffins

2 cups bran	2 tsp.
baking powder	
1 1/4 cups buttermilk	2 tsp.
baking soda	
1 large egg, beaten	1 tsp.
ground cinnamon	
1 1/4 cups pure maple syrup	1/2 cu
vegetable oil	
1 cup all-purpose flour	1 cup
raisins	

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. In a mixing bowl, combine bran, buttermilk and egg. Mix well, add maple syrup and mix again. Let stand for 5 minutes. In another bowl, mix together the flour, baking powder, baking soda and cinnamon. Gradually add the dry ingredients to the wet mixture. Stir in the oil and raisins and mix until just blended. Fill large muffin tins  $\frac{3}{4}$  full and bake for 20-25 minutes.

-Charles Street (Old Milton) Named for Dr. Charles Gardner, a local medical doctor who registered a small subdivision in the Main-Charles area in 1853. He was the first president of the Milton Mechanics' Institure (Library). In 1857 he left Milton to become resident superintendent of the Toronto General Hospital.
