

Milton Celcbrates Heritage!

The Milton Historical Society and Heritage Milton recognized individuals and organizations recently as part of Heritage Week celebrations.

The highlights included special recognition of the Town of Milton and the Fine Arts Society of Milton (F.A.S.M.) for their participation in Milton's 150th anniversary events celebrated last year.

The Town of Milton was recognzed for sponsoring Milly the Millstone mascot, the 150th logo and merchandise and for support of special events including a Winter festival, the Main Street Festival.

Milton's Amazing Race and Santa Claus parade to name a few.

F.A.S.M. was recognized for sponsoring a 150th celebration arts contest depicting various images of Milton both historic and modern. F.A.S.M. also coordinated the Town Hall expansion hoarding project which saw a variety of historic scenes painted on the plywood panels.

The other MHS award winners included Nancy Cuttle for her Jasper Martin sculpture, Jim Dills and John Challinor II for the "Milton Streets" publication, Guardian Angels Elementary School for the Educational

Award and Milton Home Hardware for their store history publication and for creating a Historic Hardware display case that was moved to a number of sites during 2007.

Heritage Milton presented awards to Mandy Sedgwick, Mirella Marshall and Manuel Maciel, Dr. Ivan and Judy Hunter and John and Kelly Abrams for renovations of inventoried residential buildings. Laurie Wells received an award for renovation of an inventoried and Jasper Martin was recognized for renovation of an inventoried commercial building.

Entertainment was provided by local youth under the direction of Judy Hunter. Thanks to V.I.P.'s Mayor Krantz, MPP Ted Chudleigh and Betty Kennedy representative for MP Garth Turner. Special thanks to Helen Comber, Gloria Brown and Marsha Waldie for helping with the refreshments and display arrangements.



Guest Speakers entertain and educate!

John McDonald's topic at our January meeting was titled "Intellectual and Social Development in Early Milton." We know that the early pioneers worked long and hard hours to get established in a new land.

One of the earliest social occasions would be the agricultural fairs where farmers would display their animals, grains and produce. The Milton Fairgrounds became the home for these agricultural celebrations. This tradition continues today even though the types of displays and events have evolved.

Milton's Victoria Park was an early center for musical entertainment with a bandstand established in 1909. The Milton Brass and Reed Band performed concerts here. There were also theatrical events such as the well known "Chautaqua" that would tour small towns in the summer.

The original Town Hall for many years hosted social event including The New Year's eve ball, the Fireman's ball, Political meetings as well as moving pictures. (cont.)

In 1894 a brick addition was added to the back of the Town Hall and this became the home of the Milton Public library for a number of years.

The Princess Theatre was opened in 1912 to show moving pictures. The original wooden building was lost in a fire and was rebuilt in 1916 and it was the site of both talking pictures, minstrel shows and other live local theatre. Today, the Galaxy theatre entertains with several theatres open to the public.

Ross Pearen was a very prominent person in Milton's local theatre scene. He directed several theatre productions including "Smith Steps Out". Ross was also a mayor of Milton and was the Chair of the 100th Anniversary celebration committee.

Milton's First Newspaper, The Halton Journal was published in 1855. There were a succession of other papers and today the tradition of Newspapers continues in the form of "The Canadian Champion" and "The Compass" as well as "Community Events" publications such as "Snap Milton".

Other organizations that have played a role in Milton's social and intellectual development included "The Mechanics Institute" which preceded the Public Library system. There have been a number of So-

cial Clubs in Milton. There was the Victoria Club for Women and the Gentlemens Club for the men. The Victoria Club members included prominent women from the community. The Historical Society has copies of programs dating back to the early 1900's. Meetings involved both musical entertainment and discussion of historical and current events.

John highlighted one of the key figures in Milton's Social scene who has not received the credit he deserves. Thomas Chisholm Livingston was born at Hornby in 1835, one of eleven children. Thomas was an Ontario Land Surveyor and had a senior position in an Insurance company. He retired to Milton in 1908 and decided to build a park, known as Livingston's Park. This park was located on the North side of Livingston Park. A bandstand was constructed, lights installed, rental boats were available as well as refreshment stands. There were also movie pictures and fireworks. Thomas Livingston can be seen on early postcards of Livingston Park. Unfortunately, Livingston Park suffered financial problems and the park went bankrupt.

Mrs. Elizabeth Bastedo of Milton went to France where she painted and taught students. Today, the Fine Arts Society of Milton (F.AS.M.) is the local organization that promotes artists locally. The Milton Historical Society through the work of then executive member Frank Sisson can claim some credit for the creation of F.A.S.M. as local artists were invited to display their art work at the 1997 Mayor's Levee.

The Social entertainment scene continues to evolve. Milton Concert Productions, Women of Note, The Milton Choristers, Country Heritage Park, Halton Region Museum, the Mohawk Raceway and individual entertainers such as Peter Appleyard, Ken Walsh, Steve Kakabos and others provide entertainment and education to the local populace.

Guelph Radial Railway on Track!

There is much writing and lots of talk about the need for more and better public transit in the Toronto area. Shara Spencer was our guest speaker from the Halton Country Radial Railway museum which is Ontario's only Operating Streetcar Museum.

The Toronto area Age of Rail took place in the late 1800's and early 1900's. The Toronto and Suburban Railway Company was formed in 1894 with the merger of two earlier streetcar companies. The earliest lines included one along side Weston road to the village of Weston and another line that ran beside Dundas road to Lambton Mills Park.

In 1911 Sir William Mackenzie, owner of the Toronto Railway Company and the Canadian Northern Railway purchased the company. In April 1917, a 74 kilometre line was built from Lambton Mills to Guelph. A passenger terminal on Keele street just north of Dundas. In 1918 the Mackenzie group of companies went bankrupt and the Toronto suburban became a part of the Canadian National Railway system. The company's streetcar routes were sold to the Toronto Transit Commission in 1923 and the Guelph branch became a subsidiary of Canadian National

Electric Railways. With running rights lost on Dundas, the company relocated its tracks to a private ROW from Lambton Mills to a proposed new terminal at St. Clair Avenue and Keele Street. In 1925 the company purchased Eldorado park, an 125 acre amusement park on the Credit River just west of Brampton. This park was purchased with the hope that it would bring passengers from the city out to the country. The Guelph Line was not profitable and by July 1931 the CNER defaulted on its bond interest and fell into receivership. To recoup losses, the rail line was cut up and sold for scrap.

The present Halton County Radial Railway was formed in 1953 by a group of men who wanted to save the TTC streetcar 1326 from being scrapped. Over the years a number of other street and radial cars have been acquired and restored. A piece of property on the original Guelph Radial Line was purchased. The tracks were replaced and today visitors can go on a streetcar ride along the original ROW. This museum opened up in 1972 and has expanded to include the Stop 92 Gift Shop. The museum arranges a number of other special events for the public including a Halloween Spooktacular. We are planning to have our June Potluck event at the Halton Radial Railway. Stay posted for more news.

Chef at Home with Reni McDonald

As with the Easter Bunny, the Easter egg predates the Christian holiday of Easter. The exchange of eggs in the springtime is a custom that was already centuries old when Easter was first celebrated. Eggs traditionally symbolize rebirth, rejuvenation and immortality and therefore are associated with Easter. They were often wrapped in gold leaf or coloured brightly by boiling them with the leaves or petals of certain flowers.

The most famous Easter eggs are the jeweled and enameled Faberge eggs that were made for the Russian tsars. In the early Christian calendar eggs were forbidden during Lent, making them popular on Easter Sunday. Today, children hunt for coloured eggs and place them in Easter baskets along with the modern version of chocolate, candy and plastic Easter eggs.

Besides boiled eggs, favourite Easter foods include hot cross buns, ham, lamb and asparagus. The following recipe is easy to prepare and will go well with Easter dinner. Enjoy!

Asparagus Vinaigrette

1 1/2 lbs. asparagus
3 tbsp. lemon juice
2 tbsp. olive oil
shrimp
1 clove garlic, minced
coarsely chopped
freshly chopped parsley

salt and pepper to taste 2 green onions, chopped 1/2 lb. cooked small

2 hardboiled eggs,

Trim asparagus to remove woody ends and peel the stalks if necessary. Boil water in a skillet and add asparagus. Cook until barely tender, about 3 minutes. Drain, refresh in cold water and spread out the asparagus on a clean kitchen towel to absorb excess water. Whisk together lemon juice, olive oil, garlic, salt and pepper. Stir in green onions and set aside. Arrange asparagus on serving platter; drizzle with half of the dressing. Scatter shrimp and eggs over top; drizzle with remaining dressing and sprinkle with parsley. The ingredients can be prepared ahead of time and assembled just be serving. Serves 6 - 8.

Milton Biographies, Volume 3

Milton Biographies, the two-volume collection of more than 200 biographies of Miltonians past that was written by the late Alex Cooke, is about to become three volumes.


Local historians Jim Dills, John Challinor II, and Marsha Waldie, are collaborating on yet another book of history -- Milton Biographies, Volume 3. Milton Biographies, Volume 1, was published by Milton Historical Society in 1995 and Volume 2 was published two years later, in 1997.

In between their other book projects over the last few years, the long-time Society members sat down and identified 250 Miltonians who figured prominently in the community we know and love today and who should be subjects of a biographical review. Given that each volume of Milton Biographies contains approximately 124 biographies, Jim. John and Marsha have identified enough subjects to write volumes 3 and 4!

At this writing, Volume 3 is about 25 percent completed. As much as Jim and John would like to complete the project just in time for the important Christmas gift-giving (and book selling!) season, that appears unlikely. Geneological research, which forms the basis of biographical writing, is the most intense and exacting form of historical accounting. Several sources are typically required to be tapped in order to create an accurate and complete biographical account. In addition, portraiture-type photography is also required for each subject. Start saving your pennies now for Christmas 2009 so you can purchase the third in the limited edition series of local biographies - Milton Biographies, Volume 3.



Microfilm reader and microfilm donated to the Archives

The Milton Historical Society was the recent benefactor of a microfilm reader donated by the local Land Registry office. Thanks go to land registrars Mr. Jeff Gilbert and Mr. Bob McKain and Ms. Sherri Arpa

The donation would not have been possible without the strong working relationship between our member Marsha Waldie and Land Registry office staff. Marsha is a frequent visitor where she researches local homes as part of our society's House Plaquing program.

The Kodak Startech Reader will enable archives staff and interested

members to view microfilm records of local newspapers and related records in the comfort and convenience of the archives

We would also like to thank Brenda Whitlock from our Archives for a generous donation which has allowed the Milton Historical Society to purchase 36 reels of The Canadian Champion Newspapers from the 1860's to 1969. These new reels complements microfilm copies of the Halton Journal acquired earlier.

Thanks also go to Gordon Bates for the donation of two wooden nail kegs from the Milton Barrel company and to Patricia-Comeau Young for her donation of Tools of the Trade. Finally, we thank Tommy Hutchinson's stepdaughter, Joan, who has donated a painting of the Bruce street school painted by Tommy Hutchinson.

Milton Historical Society Persons of Interest Program Continuing

About half of the 250 persons of Interest Program forms that were sent out by Milton Historical Society research chairman John Challinor II a year ago have come back fully completed.

The Society's Persons of Interest Program will provide valuable information for future historians who decide to write an article or publish a book about those individuals who made a significant contribution to our community. John is following up with those who have yet to complete their forms while identifying new subjects to forward forms to.

"If there's one thing I've learned over the last seven years that I've volunteered with the society, it's this: It's extremely difficult and sometimes impossible to undertake a genealogical accounting of someone's life after they've passed away." said John. "It's far better to identify key people in our community today while they're still alive and work with them to complete their genealogical history. Even then, I'm finding that the process is requiring that they do additional research with their family members because they don't know, off-hand, a number of key details about themselves."

John has encouraged everyone who has completed a form to keep a copy with their other important personal papers, like wills and investments, for the benefit of future family members.

Once each Persons of Interest Program form is completed, it is filed and stored in the Society's archive for future reference.

Early Portraits capture images of early Miltonians.

Gloria Brown has organized a photographic exhibition that includes photographs by some of Milton's Early Photographers.

Milton had some fifteen known Photographers to service the local population over the period from 1864 to the 1920's with the peak period being between the 1870's and 1900.

Some of the photographers who have their works on display include G. Burrows and J. A. Cockburn, F. K. Hunter 1909-1915, and D.M. Reid who ran his business between 1889-1897. There are several interesting portrait photographs by Featherston who used unique props such as mirrors, ornate furniture and objects held by his subjects.

There are photographs of some well known Miltonians including Dr. Clarkson Freeman and his grand-daughters along with a photo of Ross Pearen in his youthful years. Ross Pearen was very active in the community including his service as a town councillor, reeve and Mayor of Milton.

There are also some examples of ferrotype photographs and some old style cameras. In looking at the photographs, it is unfortunate that some do not have names or dates and this serves as a reminder that if you have old photographs to take the (cont. p. 3)

time to identify the people and date the photograph so that they will have more meaning to future generations.

House Plaquing submitted by Marsha Waldie

22 Court St – Lot 12 Block 8 Teetzel Survey

Built 1929 is one of the homes recently researched as part of the Society's House Plaquing program. Here are some excerpts from Marsha's research.

James W. Blain and his wife Mary Elizabeth (nee Skelton) purchased this lot in 1906. James was born in Scotland and arrived in Milton in 1905. The family owned all the land along Court St. on the west side between Main and Pearl Streets.

James started a feed, flour and coal business on the south side of Main St. between Charles and Commercial. James and Mary were members of Knox Presbyterian Church and Mary was involved with various ladies groups in the Church.

Mr. Blain built his family home on the south-west corner of Main and Court St. in the early 1900's (today Tielemans Interiors).


The lot at 22 Court St. contained a barn in which James kept his delivery wagon and a team of horses. In 1929 the barn was taken down and the present home built by contactor John Maxted.

In 1939 the home was transferred to their daughter Dorothy who in turn rented the home to various

families. Edgar Foster and his wife Kathryn rented the home for a number of years. Mr. Foster was involved in education in Milton for 36 yrs. He became know as "Mr. Education" and was respected by many of his students.

In the early 1950's the home was rented by Manual and Marguerite South and in 1971 it was sold to Mary and Gordon Wrigglesworth.

Three other owners have owned the home between 1979 and 2007 when the present owners purchased the home. Kimberly and Jesse Paulson and their son Owen love the home and neighbourhood. They enjoy living in Milton which reminds them of where they grew up.

Chef at Home with Reni McDonald

With the arrival of summer come picnics, barbeques and casual, relaxed outdoor entertaining. Barbequing is a great way to feed a crowd. The popularity of backyard cooking is reflected by the enormous selection of barbeques now available. If you don't have a backyard, you can buy a small portable model and go to a park or conservation area near you and still enjoy the outdoors. Whatever your choice, the food can be prepared in advance so you can relax and enjoy the day too.

Now that it's berry season, I thought I'd pass along a recipe that has always met with rave reviews when I serve it. It's easy to prepare and can be made early in the day and kept refrigerated. Raspberries happen to be my favourite, but you can use any berry that you prefer or even a combination. I make this dessert year round and frozen berries work well when fresh ones aren't available. Enjoy!

Raspberry Macaroon Parfaits

1 cup whipping cream1 tsp. pure vanilla extract8 crumbled macaroons1/4 cup slivered almonds, toasted2 cups fresh or frozen raspberries, thawed

Toast the almonds and cool completely. Whip the cream with the vanilla extract. Fold in the macaroons and almonds. Layer the whipped cream mixture and raspberries in alternating layers in parfait glasses. Reserve a few raspberries to garnish the top. Refrigerate until serving time. Serves 4-6.

Restorations:

Many of our heritage churches are finding that maintenance problems have crept up after more than 100 years of service to the community. Grace Anglican went through their restoration journey starting in 1998 and have certainly done a fine job.

St. Paul's United Church has been struggling with

restoration issues and the direction in which they will be following in the near future.

Knox Presbyterian Church is about to embark on a Restoration/Refurbishing Project and have begun fundraising events to assist with their project.

Our town's Historic Churches need our support and encouragement. They are major architectural elements on our Main Street and a corner stone which connect us from our past to our future. Their spires, towers and steeples have been beacons of hope, places of social events and have offered comfort to many generations of Miltonians.

From the Archives

The Milton Business College was located on Martin Street and operated in the 1930's and the 1940's. The original frame two storey building was built by Finlay Chisholm about 1904, however it was destroyed by fire in the 1970's. A new multi-residence was built on this site at 93, 95, 97 Martin Street. There are four boxes of documents on the college in the archives for viewing.

Blacksmith Shop News

The Blacksmith Shop has purchased a used anvil in order to retire another older anvil which will be kept in the shop as a historic artefact.

Colourful fans, bunting and flags were available for purchase in early May leading up to the Victoria Day Weekend. Approximately \$500 of items were sold and a number of homes were decorated in colourful Victorian colours. Thanks to Nancy Cuttle and the volunteers who helped with the sales.

The shop was open to the public for an Antique Flea market again on June 7th for the Milton Street Festival. Arts Milton held their annual Meeting where members enjoyed a game of comedy improv with some tools of the trade.

100th Anniversary of the P.L. Robertson

Company. (Excerpts from the book "P.L. Inventor of the Robertson screw" by Ken Lamb).

It was on April 6, 1908 that the P.L. Robertson Manufacturing Company directors voted to accept the Milton Town Council tax free loan of \$10,000, an exemption to certain taxes, water at eight cents per thousand gallons for up to 4,000 gallons a day, maintenance of a roadway to the company premises, and assistance in the disposal of sewage. The proposal had been signed by the Mayor and the town clerk and included the town seal.

There had been strong competition between other municipalities to secure a deal with the company. Milton's grant and personal support of Milton resident Frank Hadley and friend to P.L. were instrumental in completing the deal.

Shares were issued, construction on a one storey brick building started before the end of June 1908 and in late August two machines arrived from England, one for the machine shop and one for making screws. Business grew rapidly over the years and the company became a major employer at its peak with over 500 people on the payroll in the 1950's.

Doctor Robert K Anderson 1860-1950Submitted by Ed Goodall

Doctor Robert K Anderson practiced medicine in Milton for forty years. He was born in Trafalgar Township in 1860 and attended University of Toronto graduating in the year 1888. After taking some post graduate studies in Edinburgh, New York and Chicago, Doctor Anderson settled in a house on Main Street at the North West corner of Court Street.

In 1899 he became interested in politics and was elected to Town Council after serving one year as Auditor for the town. After four years as councillor, in 1904 he was elected as Mayor, an office he held for a further four years. During this time he also served as chairman of the Hydro Electric Commission and was a School (cont. page 6)

(Dr Anderson) Trustee.

In 1912 he arranged with Sam Henson to have a house built at 69 Martin street just across from the Martin house. He and his wife Lawrina were blessed with two children, a boy and a girl.

In 1917 Doc Anderson stood for Conservative Member of Parliament and was elected to the House of Commons representing Halton. He was re-elected four times until his retirement in 1935.

During the First World War Doc Anderson was concerned about the young men from Milton going to war in Europe. Although born in Canada his ancestors were from England and Ireland. In 1920 he obtained a memorial trophy, a captured German 77 mm Canon which he had placed between the Main Street Town Hall and the Old Post office. In 1924 it was moved to Victoria Park as he lobbied to have a cenotaph built at that location amongst heavy opposition from local politicians. In 1925 he had his way and three large blocks of granite were brought in and surmounting this is the eight foot figure of a soldier in full battle uniform.

It poured with rain on September 5th, 1926, the day of the unveiling but three thousand people turned out and the ceremony was performed by Colonel Henry Cockshutt, who was Lieut. Governor of Ontario, at the time.

After retirement from politics, Doc Anderson continued his practice for a few more years but died on July 3rd, 1950 at the age of 90, survived by his daughter Marjorie.

P.L. Robertson 100th anniversary!

Members of the Milton Historical Society, retirees of the Robertson Incorporated company and P.L.'s daughter and grandson came together to celebrate the 100 year anniversary at our December meeting.

The event coincided with our yearend potluck dinner and was held at Hugh Foster Hall. There were displays including photographs, a slide presentation, videos and early versions of the Robertson socket head screw driver and other memorabilia.

Mayor Krantz shared greetings and his recollections. As a boy he sometimes walked along the railroad tracks behind P.L.'s home and he remembers well the influential role of Mr. Robertson. Although Mayor Krantz never worked at P.L.'s he had many friends who did and this company was an important employer in the early to mid 1900's.

Ken Lamb gave an overview of the history and some of the accomplishments of P.L. and welcomed past retirees to recite their memories P.L. and the company.

Bruce Kitchen recalled how he watched P.L. going to the Post Office daily. One day he decided to stop P.L. and ask him for a job so P.L. told Bruce to meet one of the management and he started shortly thereafter. One of Bruce's jobs was to sweep the floor around some of the machines and shovel the shavings into a bin. On one occasion as Bruce was throwing a shovel full of cleanings through the air, P.L. came walking by at exactly the wrong moment and was on the receiving end of the floor cleanings. P.L. stopped and said, "Sorry my fault". As Bruce remembers he made a friend that day.

Others remember going to P.L.s home at Halloween since he was giving out nickels to the children and they made sure to go there first to make sure that P.L. did not run out of the prized coins. One of the retirees was the first woman to work at the company.

Victoria Hobbs and grandson Ron

Hobbs shared their recollections. Victoria Hobbs would sometimes meet with her father in Toronto, her memories of him were that he was a good man. She recalls that there were some spiritualists in Toronto who she feels were trying to trick P.L. out of his money but P.L. was pretty astute and avoided this potential pitfall.

Ron Hobbs never met his grandfather and has mixed feelings. P.L. has been nominated to the Canadian Manufacturing Hall of Fame and this will be decided at a meeting in the spring of 2009 in the city of Windsor.

There was a 100th anniversary celebratory cake to mark the occasion. There was also a petition circulated to all participants to put forth P.L. Robertson as a name for a future school in the Milton area and this garnered approximately 50 signatures. Interested parties may sign petitions at the Blacksmith shop or at Fitzgerald Insurance Co.

Thanks to all who helped organize this event in particular Nancy Cuttle for her leadership and persistence, Ken Lamb for his work as Master of Ceremonies and to Treasa Lamb and Lou Bradley for picking up supplies, tablecloths and setting out all the food. Our thanks also go out to the family members, the dozen or so retirees who joined us and shared their stories about P.L. and to those who shared items for display purposes.

Former MPP Jim Snow's autobiogphy rereleased by Milton Historical Society


Mr. Snow and Mr. Challinor were friends and long-time members of the same political family, the Ontario Progressive Conservative Party. Mr. Challinor had assisted Mr. Snow with the marketing of the book when it was originally published in 1990.



Military Mails—Insights on early battles

Hobden, a local Miltonian who loves collecting stamps and enjoys history including Canadian military.

David has an interesting hobby of collecting Military mail some of which date back to the early military conflicts on the new continent. The very earliest mail was both envelope and letter combined on one piece of paper. This means that the envelope details and the contents of the letter itself are all on one piece of paper and are valuable historical documents.

He presented a chronological review of early Cana

dian History and some key battles and historic dates. David intertwines military mail from the time of these key events to provide the perspective of a military officer or soldier at that time. Some of these letters had been mailed to acquaintances back in Europe or to some of the early colonies such as Boston.

Ship letters moved by boat and Packet letters over land. The price of mailing letters for the British mili tary could be quite expensive, a letter sent from Fort Erie to Scotland cost 8 schillings or in today's curency about \$300 dollars.

Our guest speaker for our October meeting was David Milton had an active militia and soldiers here were part of the Second gore. David has one of the earliest known pieces of mail postmarked from Milton. The letter was dated November 30, 1838 and was penned by George A. Brown to a Mr. Chisholm in Oakville requesting payment for salary for 18 volunteer militia members.

Col. John McRae—A man of many talents

Ken Irvine from the McRae house in Guelph presented to us an overview of the life and time of Colonel John McRae at our November meeting.

John McRae's grandparents came to the Guelph area from Scotland. They started a lumber mill in the Puslinch area and were very successful. This was followed by a woolen mill in the 1860's in Guelph which employed more than 200 employees at its peak and the quality of their wool won medals at renowned agricultural fairs. John's father was more interested in the military and being a gentleman farmer. This influenced John and at the age of 16 he was selected as the best trained cadet in Ontario. He liked to read and also liked to sketch and was a very bright child. He went to the University of Toronto for a Bachelor of Arts degree at the age of 17. He was very active in the glee club, rugby club and the militia. John wrote many letters home to his mother and he was fond of a young lady named Alice who died at a young age and this was said to have affected him very deeply. Fortunately these letters have been kept for future generations. John had some close lady friends in later life but never did marry.

John taught math and English at the University of Guelph at the age of 18. He was influenced to study towards a medical degree at the U of T. He ended up going to McGill University in Montreal and did his internship at John Hopkins hospital. He was known as being very compassionate, kind hearted and had a love of animals. He would sometimes sneak in a cat to a patient to provide them friendship during a hospital stay.

In Montreal, John became friends with some prominent writers including Lucy Maud Montgomery and Stephen Leacock. He also knew Lord Grey. John had an adventurous side and went on a ship expedition to try and find a port on Hudson's Bay.

When WWI broke out, John was in Europe and cabled back that he wanted to enlist in an artillery unit and he was made the physician for an artillery unit. He was 41 years old. Col. McRae was close to the front lines and was at Ypres during the first poison gas attacks and this was one of the worst experiences in his life, he lost a very close friend killed by a bomb. John read the service at his friends funeral and the day afterwards he wrote the poem "In Flanders Fields". John did not survive the war, he contracted pneumonia and worked himself too hard and he was felled by meningitis and on January 28th, 1918 he passed away. There was a full military funeral and he

was buried in Wimereux cemetery in France.

The poppies that we know so well today result from a campaign started by a French woman to raise money for orphans. Col. McRae's medals were sold at an auction and acquired by Millionaire Mr. Arthur Lee who in turn donated the medals to the McRae house.

Chef at Home with Reni McDonald

With the Holiday Season approaching and all the entertaining that goes with it, I thought appetizer recipes would be appropriate. I have made this stuffed mushroom recipe for years. It's always been popular. You can make it ahead of time and keep refrigerated; then just bake and serve. The smoked salmon spread is easy to prepare, can be made ahead and will keep for several days – if it lasts that long.

Stuffed Mushrooms

18 large mushrooms 1 small onion, chopped 2 tbsp. butter 1 can of shrimp, rinsed and drained salt, pepper and cream grated parmesan cheese

Clean mushrooms. Remove stems and chop. Sauté onion in butter and stir in chopped mushroom stems. Chop shrimp and blend in with salt, pepper and enough cream to bind everything together. Spoon filling into mushroom caps and sprinkle with cheese. Bake in preheated 375 degree F. oven for 20 - 30 minutes or until piping hot. (You can also substitute lobster, crabmeat or smoked oysters for the shrimp.)



Electric Streetcars – Still Running after all these years!

Our members took a step back in time at the June potluck dinner held at the Halton County Radial Railway. The event started with a potluck dinner in the museum followed by rides in a variety of electric streetcars from different eras. We travelled on two different TTC street cars vintage 1920's and 1950's. The train conductors were dressed in period costumes and provided insight into the operations of the streetcars. The TTC streetcars were designed to move commuters efficiently and cost effectively, they were large but spartan.

Members also had the opportunity to sit in the London and Port Stanley

railcar # 8 built in 1915. In contrast to the TTC cars, the Port Stanley railcar features beautiful wooden walls, stained glass windows, chandelier style lighting and a smoking section. This railcar is a relic of a time when citizens of London would leave the city to travel to Port Stanley to enjoy music and other attractions on the shores of Lake Erie. Twenty six members drove to the museum north of Milton to experience electric train travel.

The Halton County Radial Railway carries passengers through the forests along the original rail lines of the Toronto Suburban Railway running between Toronto and Guelph. This museum and its volunteers are to be commended for their impressive col-

lection of railcars and dedicated volunteers.

WWI Soldiers Remembered

The First World War ended 90 years ago this year. Although there are only a few soldiers who are still alive from that war, some details of the lives of these soldiers are now easily available to all thanks to archival records and internet resources.

The Milton Historical Society website has a section which is dedicated to Milton Soldiers from World War I. This website began as a Web blog that was developed by one of our members Richard Laughton. This Blog contains links to other websites such as the Veteran Affairs Canada which includes details on soldiers military service, a link to the First World War Book of Remembrance in Ottawa, digital photo collection and burial information. There is a link to the Library and Archives Canada website where the signed Attestation Papers for each soldier are available for viewing and finally there is also a link to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission website which lists the location of the burial plot for each solider.

Richard completed the index for all the Milton soldiers listed on the cenotaph at Victoria Park Square in 2007 and he is currently working to compile similar information for those soldiers listed on the Haltonville cenotaph. In addition, the MHS archives contain photocopy records of WWI soldiers for research or viewing.

P.L. Robertson 100th Anniversary

It is a testament to the success of the Robertson socket head screw that the company established in 1908 in Milton is celebrating its 100th anniversary in business this year. Robertson Inc. today has two manufacturing facilities, one in China and the other in Montreal as well as three sales/warehouse facilities in Milton, Calgary and Port Coquitlam.

For those interested in the history of the Robertson

Manufacturing Co. there is an excellent book entitled "P.L. Inventor of the Robertson Screw" researched by MHS member Ken Lamb. This book tells the story of the early years of the company and describes the colourful personality and business ambitions that made P.L. the success he became.

P.L. was an inventor, a businessman and his success created many jobs and brought prosperity to the then small Town of Milton. The Robertson Manufacturing Company was the town's major employer for many years. Today the company's presence in Milton has changed significantly. The manufacturing facilities have been closed and those buildings demolished.

The website for the company lists over a dozen choices of fasteners based on the application needed. There are deck screws, wood screws, concrete screws to name but a few. All the products bear in common the square recess. This simplifies working because the deep recessed square helps prevent the screw driver bit from slipping out of the screw saving time and energy. An additional benefit of a secure fastener is less potential to damage the article being worked on. The Robertson screw and screw driver are little changed from those of a century ago.

The Milton Historical Society will be celebrating the 100th anniversary of P.L. Robertson at our December general meeting which has been moved up to Thursday, December 4th at 6 PM. We hope to have displays and invite past and present employees

James Landsborough became the owner of lot 10 and this lot about 1887. He came from Scotland and served as a Town Constable in 1890. He was a first class carpenter and a member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, "the old Kirk" located at approx. 54 Main Street.

James was also a member of the Milton Home Circle No. 71 and Milton Men's Club in which he was in charge every evening in 1906 of the reading room.

Milton Historical Society researcher, Jack Charlton, indicated through his past research that some of the building materials used in 85 Robert Street were taken from the original Quatre Bras School SS # 2, Esquesing.

Mr. Landsborough built this heritage home in approximately 1885 and carted the materials from the school.

In 1901 the home was sold to John Hanley who had lost his wife Mary Ann (nee Tindill) in 1893. The family had farmed in Esquesing and are interred in the Boston Church Cemetery.

The home remained in the family following John's

death in 1907; however by 1939 John Storey had purchased it.

Margaret (nee Nugent) and Joseph E. Timbers bought the home in 1946. The home remained in their family until 1991. Mr. Timbers was a butcher and worked in a shop on the Main Street. They had a family of five and were members of Knox Presbyterian Church. One of their sons, Gordon, is a Presbyterian Church Minister in a small community north of Toronto.

The home past through various other owners and is today owned by Tara (nee Faggion) and Gareth Llewellyn and their daughter Gwen. They have been busy doing some cosmetic fixups and plan some further renovations in the near future. They are very proud of this heritage home.

It's a "foodies" paradise. The current trend in cooking is all about shopping locally and eating what's in season. A trip to the Farmer's Market makes that easy.

Now that local apples are in season this recipe is a favourite at our place. You can use your choice of apple and the recipe can easily be doubled – just bake it in a larger pan. This is delicious served warm with ice cream or cheddar cheese. Enjoy!

Apple Crisp

6 cups peeled, cored and sliced apples
2 tbsp. white sugar (more if apple is tart)
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 cup butter or margarine
3/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup flour
1/2 cup oatmeal
1/4 tsp. salt

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Place sliced apples in greased 8x8 inch baking dish. Sprinkle with white sugar and cinnamon. In a bowl, cream the butter and brown sugar. Blend in flour, oatmeal and salt. Sprinkle mixture on top of apples and bake for 40 – 50 minutes.

From the Archives

The Milton Historical Society recently acquired a construction level and Baseball Bat donated by Harold Coulson. The level belonged to John Maxted who was a bricklayer and building contractor in Milton. He was involved in building several downtown stores, Knox Church, old Post Office, and homes in the Milton area. The bat belonged to Conrad Totelzka 1887-1963, who was a major sports personality in Milton and he used this bat. Mr. Coulson also donated a number of other items to the archives eg. old letters, documents etc. related to Milton's History.

Many of you know Robert Sandowsky who has been closely associated with the Halton County Radial Railway for many years. Bob is a train photographer and when he learned we were interested in local train pictures, he put together a disc of a dozen picture including one of the "Peanut", a self propelled diesel passenger train and mail car connecting Hamilton and Milton.

These photographs are full colour and excellent quality and include a variety of CN and CPR trains of different eras including both freight and passenger trains and steam and diesel powered engines. (see next page for an example).

Jim Dills has received a DVD for us of a movie taken in Milton in 1949. The movie lasts for about 45 minutes. Thanks to May Johnson for her donation of the Galbraith and Co. Dry Goods Store accounting books.

Brad Clements has also donated a two sided wooden sign from the Milton Business College as well as some iron wheel rims which the blacksmiths will recycle into new items.
